
"It is a faithful saying: for if we were dead with Him, we shall also live with Him." - 2 Timothy 2:11



What is Martyrdom?

The word *martyr* is derived from the ancient Greek word for witness

Began with the Jews persecuting Christians until pagan Rome tried to destroy Christianity as a whole






Emperors Of The Roman Empire

Began the first persecution of Christians: 54 - 68 AD



Domitian
Referred himself to the title
Lord and God: 81 - 96 AD




Trajan
Persecuted Christians,
martyred Ignatius, Bishop of
Antioch, and Simeon, the
Bishop of Jerusalem:
97 - 117 AD



Marcus Aurelius

First emperor to actively look for Christians & spread propaganda against Christianity: 161 - 180 AD


Emperors Of The Roman Empire

Tried to persecute all

Christianity: 193 - 211 AD




Gaius Julius Verus Maximinus Thrax Barbarian, was evil in his persecution of Christians: 235 - 238 AD



Decius

Decided to kill all Priests and
Bishops, Christians couldn't
express their faith: 249 - 251 AD



Valerian
Banned Christians from expressing their religion: 253 - 260 AD


Aurelian
Persecuted people who followed Christians: 270 - 275 AD



Diocletian
Our Coptic Orthodox Church
created its own calendar of the
Martyrs by the first year he
reigned: 284 - 305 AD



Constantine The Great Ended up adopting Christianity as the main religion of the Roman Empire: 305 - 337 AD



Types of Martyrs

- Died for the sake of faith
- ♦ Died for the sake of purity
 - St. Theodora
 - St. Veronica
- Died for the sake of dogma
 - Pope Discorus
 - St. Theodorus







Mentally

They faced degrading insults, their possessions and wealth were taken



Physically

Faced prison and intense physical tortures

Emotionally

Took situations full of emotional hardship and gained joy and peace





St. Stephen: The First Martyr


"And all that sat in the council, looking steadfastly on him, saw his face as if it had been the face of an angel" (Acts 6:15)

His face looked like the face of an angel because of:

- God's Grace
- The compassion & prayers of the church
- The feeling of honour that they are partners of pain with the Saviour
- Visions of heavenly glory







Why Would Someone Want to Become a Martyr?

Desire

Martyrdom was not suicide or foolishness - martyrs loved Christ and refused to deny their faith

Courage

The martyrs had a virtuous courage - through their blood, the seeds of Christianity were watered



Why Would Someone Want to Become a Martyr?




Evangelize

Through their steadfast faith, many were converted

They demonstrated their beliefs through their actions, not only by their words

"In devouring the sheep, the wolves became sheep." - Tertullian
